The Tuck Shop

Please note that the Tuck Shop in its present form will close two weeks today – **Friday 2**nd **March**. This is the last day before the week-long March break.

When we reopen on Monday 12th March we will be introducing a new model of providing hot meals. Full details will follow shortly but some of the changes will be as follows.

- No food will be prepared in the Tuck Shop.
- A limited but varied and nutritious choice will be offered each day.
- Meals must be ordered in advance.
- The Tuck Shop will only be open during second break.
- A limited range of waters, juices and healthy snacks will also be on sale.

It has been noted many times that the Tuck Shop was never intended to be a facility that could provide cooked meals for a school where 600 people work (and eat!) every day and we have decided the time has come to stop trying.

And even the new model will be – and can only be – a stop-gap measure pending the construction of a new facility that is designed from the outset to meet the needs of the school.

On that front, we are making good progress. The concept is fast taking shape and I hope to be able to share with you further details soon.

The much-delayed Primary reports were issued a week ago today. Not unexpectedly, there were a few glitches but, for the most part, the new system appears to have worked. (Phew!)

Student-Led Conferences

The Student-Led Conferences will be here before we know it. They are taking place during the day on **Thursday**, **1st March**. (Please note that **there is no school for Primary students** on this day; students only come to school for their scheduled conferences.) If you haven't already received the invitation with your scheduled time, you should be receiving it today or Monday at the latest. If there is a conflict with the scheduled time that you have been given, please contact your child's teacher to make arrangements for another time.

What is the format for the Student-Led Conference?

The students are responsible for leading the conference and sharing their learning with their parents. They may demonstrate their learning through different stations or centres, sharing samples of their work and their portfolios. There will most likely be other children scheduled at the same time for the conference in the Homeroom.

You are strongly encouraged to make time to visit the Specialist classes, either before or after the Homeroom conference, as these classes are an equally important part of your child's school experience. The Specialist teachers will also have stations, activities and/or work for your child to show you. Your child will have a checklist of the various Specialist teachers to be visited, and will be your guide to these classrooms.



What is my role as a parent during the conference?

First and foremost it is important that you are fully present. Your cellphone should be turned off or put on silent so that you are not distracted during your conference. Your role is to listen, encourage, show interest, be constructive, be sensitive and to ask questions. This is your child's time to have your undivided attention. It is a time to celebrate your child's learning and the accomplishments that he/she has made so far this academic year. During the conference you will also be able to support your child with reflecting on what he/she has done well and with setting goals for areas that can be further developed.

What if I want to talk with the teacher about my child's progress?

The teacher will be present during the conference, supporting the students as needed. Your child's sharing of his/her learning and work should provide evidence of the progress your child is making. If there are any specific concerns that you would like to discuss with the teacher, please arrange with the teacher for a separate appointment to take place the week prior to the conferences or after the March holiday.

I'm sure you will find the conferences to be a rewarding experience for both you and your child.

Small school athletics

Last week Thursday, WIS took part in the Small Schools Athletics Meet. The other competing schools that took part in this event were St. Paul's, Holy Cross Convent, The Waldorf School and Highlands Christian School.

The WIS Team consisted of students from Year 5 to Year 8 competing in various events such as the 1200m, 100m, long jump, shot put, etc.

The middle distances (800m and 1200m) are always the most challenging; an athlete needs good stamina and muscular endurance. We had runners in both events, but only two athletes (Quentin Strauss and Salome Rey) managed to qualify for the Zone B Athletics Meet.

In the short sprints, WIS always faces stiff competition from the other schools. Sprinters should have speed, power and run with proper technique. Although many of our sprinters finished in top four positions, only Ndahafa Muadinohamba, Natalie Segamwenge and Kevin Amaambo qualified for Zone B.

In the field events, most of our athletes demonstrated proper technique. Dante Luiperth finished first in the long jump and his older brother, Amani, finished first in the Shot-put and Javelin, and second in the Discus. Ndahafa Muadinohamba and Olwen Black finished first and second respectively in the girls Shot-put; in the High Jump girls under twelve, Natalie Segamwenge finished in first place. All these athletes qualified for Zone B.

WIS finished third overall on the points table which is an achievement considering the size of our student body; we are looking forward to next year's competition and to achieve even better results!

I also want to give a BIG thank you to all the athletes for their efforts and to staff members that assisted as officials.

Information session coming up - IGCSE and IBDP - What do I need to know to be able to ensure my child picks the right subjects?

Next week Tuesday, 20th February 2018, we have our annual Information Session for students in Years 9 & 11 to give them some information about the course they will be embarking upon in the next academic year.

The IGCSE course selection is still very broad and students are encouraged to choose courses/subjects they enjoy. When choosing subjects for the IBDP, however, more thought and discussion needs to accompany the choice of subjects. Depending on what a student plans to do in their future, these subject choices are important. When planning to move into the field of science, sciences should certainly be a focus. When planning to go into the field of business English and Economics should be chosen as Higher Level subjects.



The role of parents in this process is critical. Parents should have a realistic judgement of their child's aptitude and strengths and advise their child accordingly. Another aspect that always plays a big role is the availability of funds. Tertiary education is becoming increasingly costly and scholarships are available, but the competition for places and scholarships at prestigious universities is fierce.

Another consideration that might play into the discussion of subject choices is the country where a student will want to pursue their further education once they have completed school. Again, it is important to be realistic both with regard to a student's strengths as well as with regard to the financial means available for such education.

We therefore urge parents to take the time to inform themselves together with their children about choices that are eminent now at the end of Year 9 or Year 11.

On Tuesday, we will also have other institutions present at our information session. CATS will be available to chat about their programme. The FNCC, will also be available to talk about their institution.

We look forward to welcoming many parents to our information session on Tuesday. It is an excellent opportunity to meet subject teachers, coordinators and speak to students who are currently completing the IB Diploma.


